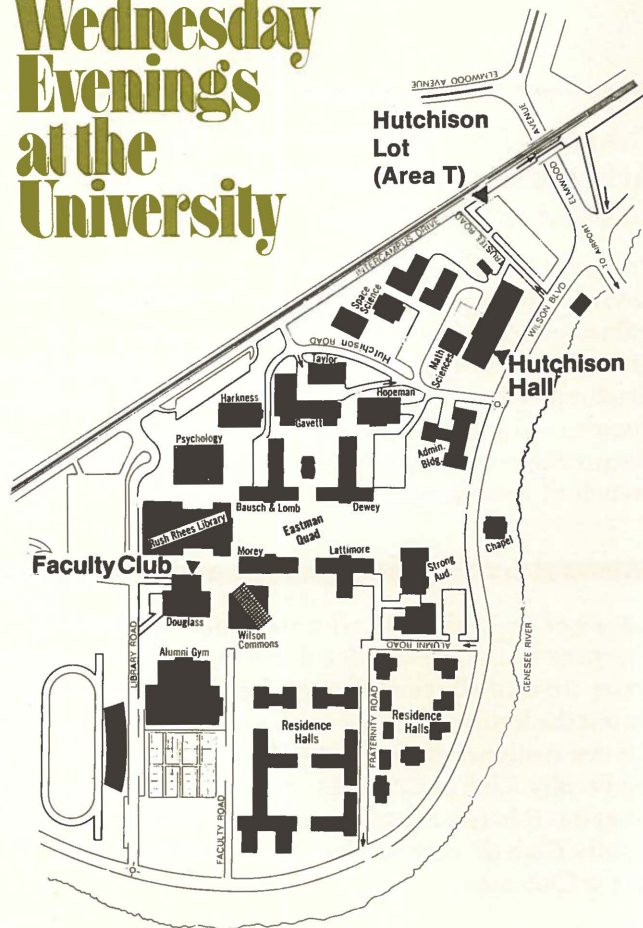

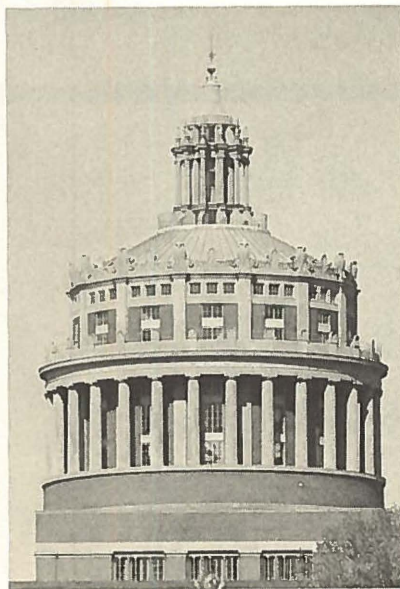

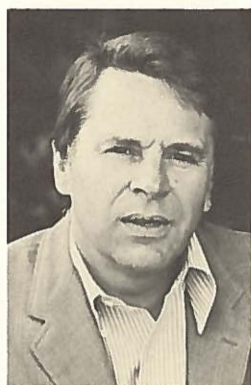
The University of Rochester is pleased to present the first half of its fourth annual series of community lectures featuring four of the University's distinguished faculty members.

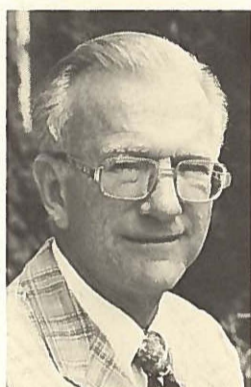


**Christopher Lasch, Professor of History:  
"The Culture of Narcissism"**

Professor Lasch is a nationally known social and cultural historian whose most recent books, *The Culture of Narcissism* and *Haven in a Heartless World*, have been highly acclaimed. Winner of a Guggenheim research grant in 1964, he has been a frequent contributor to *The New York Times* and other national publications.

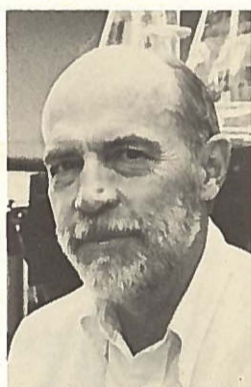


**Walter I. Garms, Jr., Professor of Education  
and Human Development: "Property Taxes  
and the Public Schools: How Can We  
Do Better?"**

Professor Garms, an authority on the financing of education, last year was appointed by the Brookings Institution to a national advisory panel studying the financing of community and junior colleges. He has been a consultant for government, schools, and private organizations and is co-author of the book *School Finance: The Economics and Politics of Public Education*.

**Robert K. Selander, Professor of Biology:  
"The Proper Study of Man: Evolutionary  
Perspectives on Human Nature"**

Professor Selander, former Chairman of the Department of Biology, is internationally known for his work in population genetics, sociobiology, and the molecular study of evolution. A former President of the Society for the Study of Evolution, he has won several awards for his research, including a Guggenheim Fellowship and the Walker Prize of the Boston Museum of Science.

**David H. Douglass, Professor of Physics and  
Astronomy: "Neutron Stars, Black Holes, and  
Gravitational Radiation"**

Professor Douglass, a nationally known experimental physicist, heads a National Science Foundation-sponsored project seeking to detect the existence of gravity waves, or gravitational radiation. A former Sloan Research Fellow, Professor Douglass has said that the discovery of gravity waves, a force analogous to electromagnetic radiation, "could lead to a whole new branch of astronomy."
